Activity 1: Jack and the Beanstalk

When Jack's mother saw the beans she was so angry she threw the beans out of the cottage window, where they landed in the Tatton Park Garden. The next morning, Jack looked out of the window. At the top Jack found a beautiful castle. He entered and heard a loud voice. 'Fee, fi, fo, fum!'. An enormous giant came into the room and sat down. On his table there was a hen, and a golden harp. This will help it stay upright, and it will start to wrap itself round the stick. Water your plant – but not too much! Happy Planting!

Activity 2: A Royal Bad Night's Sleep

The Prince kindly offered her to stay the night where she would be safe and warm. The Prince wanted to test the Princess to see if she was a real Princess. He snuck into her room, took all the bedding off the bedstead and laid a single dried pea on the bottom. Then he took 20 mattresses and laid them on the pea.



You see a real Princess would be able to feel even the smallest of peas under all those mattresses. The next morning the Prince asked how she had slept.

Reset the balls and the cushions for each round.

Activity 3: Rapunzel and the Tatton Tower

One day, a selfish old witch named Gothel kidnapped the young Rapunzel and locked her in the tallest tower in Tatton Park's Gardens with no way of escape.
